Course Outline:

Lane Tech says: An AP English course in Literature and Composition engages students in the careful reading and critical analysis of imaginative literature. Through the close reading of selected texts, students deepen their understanding of the ways writers use language to provide both meaning and pleasure for their readers. As they read, students will consider a work's structure, style, and themes as well as smaller-scale elements such as the use of figurative language, imagery, symbolism, and tone. Reading in an AP course is both wide and deep. This reading necessarily builds upon the reading done in previous English courses. In their AP course, students read works from several genres and periods- from the sixteenth to the twenty-first century- but more importantly, they get to know a few works well. In addition to considering a work's literary artistry, students reflect on the social and historical values it reflects and embodies.

Loyola University says: This course is available as a dual credit course through Loyola University Chicago. Should you choose to participate in the program, you can earn college credit while at the same time fulfilling your high school graduation requirements. Ms. Jennings says: This AP Literature and Composition course is focused on a broad selection of canonical world literature ranging from the 1600's to modern texts. Students read a new text every three-four weeks on average, and are engaged in discussions, critical response essays, as well as independent research projects. Students will practice AP test taking skills in preparation for the examination. AP style in-class critical response essays will be completed with a scoring system of 1 (lowest) to 9 (highest) utilized as the grading classification.

In addition, students will complete three projects. A poet/poetry project will be comprised of biographical and historical information on a chosen poet included with analysis of 10-15 poems. The second project is a senior research essay. Finally, students will create a multi-faceted project responding to the idea of "Identity: the personal and cultural self," and apply various texts from the year.

Regardless if you participate in the Loyola program or not, this is a college level experience with corresponding expectations. This additional benefit requires that you fulfill the reading and response expectations of an undergraduate course. The main purpose of this class is not only to expand your knowledge base of these texts, but to expose you to alternative cultural and social ideologies, to enhance your skills as critical readers and thinkers, and to assist you in being thoughtful, contributing participants in society.

Policies and Expectations:

- * Arrive on time, be prepared with required materials, and wear your ID *everyday*.
- * Respect- this includes:
 - Yourself- dress appropriately according to Lane Tech policies and general good taste. If you fail to do so, we will make arrangements for you to be presentable.
 - Your instructor- I will not sleep, eat, snap, tweet, insta, or listen to music via headphones during class. I expect you to reciprocate. This is not your lunch period, nap time or commute.
 - Water in plastic bottles is allowable. Special events *may* warrant food or beverage consumption, but will be PRE-APPROVED by me on an individual basis.
 - Your environment and fellow humans- I will NOT clean up after you.

- Complete and present all assignments on time. *Late Policy Below*
- Cheating and Plagiarism will *NOT* be tolerated. You will receive a zero for the entire assignment and be disciplined accordingly. Cheating is lame; don't try it.

Reading & Homework:

- All reading or homework is due at the beginning of the class period. If you fail to present your work, you will have **TWO** opportunities each semester to receive half credit by turning it in the next day. If you are out with an excused absence, you will have the opportunity to complete work without penalty for that day. If you cut class, you will receive a zero for that day's work and attendance.
- We will be utilizing an on-line classroom for posting assignments, keeping track of due dates and class activities, and participating in discussion starters for further in-class consideration (www.jenningslanetech.weebly.com). Whether it is from this resource, or from a classmate, you are responsible for obtaining any missed class work. You have one day to make up any missed assignments.
- Major essays and project due dates will be established well in advance. If you are absent on such a due date, you must notify me to confirm an acceptable way to turn in your work (mailbox/email/etc.). Any paper may be re-written for consideration. The higher of the two grades will be your final. Any re-writes must be turned in within a week of initial grade.
